Boylston's Memorial Day

Memorial Day has become known to us in Boylston as the last Monday in May. That date was enacted under the Uniform Monday Holiday Act during Richard Nixon's presidential term in 1971 and was a day to remember all fallen soldiers from all wars. But historically it was first known as Decoration Day as flowers and flags were placed at the graves of the Civil War soldiers.

Virginia and Mississippi each claim to have been the first to celebrate by placing flowers on gravesites in 1866. In Boylston, Massachusetts, it was Mrs. Sarah G. Partridge, who is believed to have started the tradition of decorating graves. As stepmother to John W. Partridge, a private in the Signal Corp during the Civil War, who died in 1864 at the notorious Andersonville Prison; she honored the memory of John and his fallen companions by placing flowers on their graves.

It was not long after the Southerners claim in 1866, however, that General John A. Logan, head of the Grand Army of the Republic, an organization of Union veterans, founded a Memorial Day in 1868 to honor the 620,000 who died in the Civil War. Logan chose May 30 as the holiday "because it didn't fall on the same day as the anniversary of any particular battle." According to historian William Dupuis, May 30, 1872 Boylston held its first Memorial Day parade."²

May 30th was the day for many years that the soldiers were remembered, and that date lasted from the late 19th century until 1971 as noted above. That meant the day might fall on any day of the week and the holiday was planned accordingly. One of our oldest news clippings of 1879 outlines the activities as:

"Memorial Day was appropriately observed in Boylston."

Shortly after ten o'clock a.m. soldiers and citizens formed a procession on the common, followed by the Boylston Brass Band, all then marched to the burial grounds. There prayers were said by the Rev. H.S. Kimball. Following prayers, a dirge was played while flowers were appropriately placed. Once that was completed, they countermarched back to Congregational Church for a special address. The day ended with a collation being served at the Town Hall, just off the Town Common.

Since Memorial Day then could fall on any day of the week, old clippings indicate there was a pattern of holding a patriotic sermon in the local churches on the Sunday prior to May 30, where Boylston's fallen and all veterans were particularly honored; and likewise in the schools, on the last school day before Memorial Day, patriotic exercises were held.

The procession will then counter march to the Congregational Church where the address will be given by

COMRADE J. BRAINERD HALL of Worcester A Veteran of the 57th Regt., Mass. Vols.

It is earnestly desired that the soldiers of the European and of the Spanish-American Wars will join in the services and proce Since the last Memorial Day peace has dawned upon this war-stricken world, the God of Nations has crowned our armies and our stricken world, the God of Nations has crowned our armies and our allies with victory and we look hopefully forward to a speedy adjustment of international affairs and a lasting peace among the nations of the earth, and so let us come to this day's services with feelings of thankfulness as well as of sadness. Let us strew with the brightest and fairest of flowers the graves of our heroic and immortal dead, remembering that as good soldiers, loyal to their country in the darkest hours of its national history, "they fought the good fight, finished

That program of events and parades held firm until 1918 and 1919 when the "Memorial Day Services: Boylston" no longer included any collation or lunch. A message from Herbert C. Hoover, Food Commissioner under President Wilson, had asked

"the people to conserve food, especially meat and wheat, and President Woodrow Wilson's proclamation, called upon all the people to make May 30 a day of fasting and prayer."4

This was honoring the sacrifices that were being made during World War I.

Today, 151 years later, our Boylston citizens and soldiers still gather to form a Memorial Day parade to the two burial grounds where the solemn process continues of saying prayers and decorating graves with flowers and flags. Once again food is acceptable to be served; thus, on Boylston Town Common there are various community organizations which hold booths with food to sell and information on how you may participate in the various group activities.
